


Chain Reaction

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Spring Tour Roundup



Lights Shine on the Boys in Atlanta

As we eagerly wait for the U.S. Postal Service to deliver our Summer Tour tickets, it's fun to think back on a successful Spring Tour that broke out six new songs and again dipped into The Beatles' library of sparkling tunes.

Best new additions to the Dead's song repertoire are Broken Arrow, a song off Robbie Robertson's first solo album, sung by Phil, and Days Between, a new Hunter-Garcia creation that is underpinned by nice harpsichord-like effects from Vince Welnick. That isn't to say the other new songs are unappreciated: Bobby's Eternity, Jerry's Liberty and Lazy River Road, The Beatles' Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds (song by Jerry) and I Fought the Law (also sung by Jerry). Phil even dusted off Wave to the Wind and brought it back in a new, slower reworked fashion after shelving it following last spring's disastrous tryout. The new songs added a spirit of excitement and adventure to the Spring Tour.

Jerry's voice sounded strong and clear, indicating a full recovery from last summer's health problems and the combined beneficial effects of kicking tobacco and switching to a vegetarian diet. In fact, Jerry was carrying most of the load on the new songs, singing three of the Dead's four new original tunes and both new encore songs, Lucy and Law.

Bobby, poor thing, apparently was fighting a cold most of the time -- probably picked up during the nasty blizzard that cancelled the first Richfield, Ohio, show. The Washington Post's reviewer described Bobby's voice during the first night of the Cap Centre run as having a "slight wheeze." The rhythm guitarist also was noticeably conserving energy during the second set in Chapel

Hill, although he put his full voice into *Throwing* Stones and even strutted his stuff at the edge of the stage.

So how's that new album look? Let's see: So Many Roads, Corrina, Broken Arrow, Lazy River Road, Eternity>Liberty, Long Way To Go Home, Wave to the Wind and Days Between. Yup, that's nine new songs -- enough to fill up an album.

The influx of new material means that some old favorites are fading from view. Goin' Down the Road Feelin' Bad, High Time, Cumberland Blues, Comes A Time, Midnight Hour, Let the Good Times Roll, Baby Blue, They Love Each Other, Beat It On Down the Line and Dark Star all had appeared only once through the April 5th Nassau end to Spring Tour, which includes the first 26 shows of 1993. Foolish Heart has dropped out of sight altogether. The rarity of so many oldies-but-goodies certainly adds to the appreciation for them if you're lucky enough to catch the show where one of them is performed.

* Chicago fans got a Mind Left Body jam out of Corrina and a now-rare Baby Blue encore on the second night. Ken Nordine performed one of his word jazz interplays during the space segment on the third night.

* Richfield Deadheads lost a show due to snow, but got the first I Fought the Law encore.

* The Cap Centre was, well, the Cap Centre, but all three Landover shows had their sparkling moments. On the first night, fans were treated to a full-force Phil bass jam with Vince chiming in. On the second night, the old Irish melodies of Handsome Cabin Boy filled space. That also was the night of the Lucy in the Sky

breakout. The third night, Bruce Hornsby joined the boys for the second set and steered them into a blistering *China>Rider*. Then, during space, Jerry played around with some Bach themes.

* In Chapel Hill, Carolina Deadheads were treated to a Spanish Jam>GDTRFB -- perhaps the only one of the year, if last year is a guide (see review page 10).

* Albany fans got all sorts of goodies - Comes A Time, a High Time, an Attics, Let the
Good Times Roll, Black-Throated Wind and Johnny
B. Goode.


* Nassau heads got the only Rain of the tour, a special guest appearance from Barney the dinosaur, a Midnight Hour and They Love Each Other. The fifth and final night featured an unheard-of double set closer pairing Music Never Stopped with Deal, opened the second set with Law and closed it with Gloria

(see review page 11). But, unfortunately, Spring Tour also had its low points.

Deadheads weren't well received in Chapel Hill, a North Carolina city that prepared for us like an invasion of locusts. Locals posted "no camping" signs everywhere and copped an attitude: "They have been so polite it almost makes me sick," the manager of Travel Time Inn was quoted as saying. Police set up a drug checkpoint on Interstate 40 just west of Chapel Hill and pulled every car bedecked with Dead stickers. Two days of drug checks netted the cops a total of one ounce of pot and three ounces of mushrooms from 24 drug charges.

But while the first day's press was almost friendly, accounts of the second night were downright ugly. "Riot breaks out at Grateful Dead

Capital Centre Miracle Seekers

Capital Centre Review

Being fully aware of the Prince Georges County police department's thoughts on vending, we skipped what can sometimes be a hairy scene and arrived at the Capital Centre near showtime. For some reason, being frisked amused me. I thought the female security guard was going to ask me to remove her clothes, the search was so thorough.

Summing up the first night in Landover is simple: It was a standard, rather uninspiring evening. The one shining light was Phil's bass jam at the end of *Uncle John's Band* before the *Drums* segment. He played solo for a number of minutes -- lovely clear notes -- and then was joined by Vince. It was a treat. But I wish the Dead would retire *US Blues* for a while. They seem to reserve that encore, each season, just for me.

The second night was "new song night" and Jerry had a music stand on his left side so he could refer to the lyrics. We got three new tunes in the first set, Jerry's Days Between in the second set and the first reading of The Beatle's Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds as the night's encore. The only problem with Lucy was the Cap Centre crowd; they were so loud they almost drowned out Jerry. Also of note was a beautiful treatment of Handsome Cabin Boy as the primary portion of space. Seeing as it was St. Patrick's Day, the old Irish jig feel of Cabin Boy was fittingly appropriate for the evening.

The third night was a blast! We almost missed Hell in a Bucket because we cut it close getting in. Phil's Broken Arrow was beautiful. His voice this year is clear and strong and we were told by a fan that he's been taking voice lessons. Bobby's Masterpiece was terrific and we all had fun with Music Never Stopped.

The second set was perfect and long. Bruce joined the band for most of it, coming and going as he pleased to help with vocals and jamming on his accordian. As if we didn't know who Bruce was, Jerry introduced him after the fantastic China/Rider. Bruce's strong voice was noticable over the rest of the band during the Rider chorus, which, after all, is one of his favorite Dead tunes. Vince's Long Way to go Home was nice the first and maybe even the second time, but we'd go a long way not to hear it again. We enjoyed Wave to the Wind, even though we seem to be in the minority. Bobby did a rousing Estimated and Terrapin was perfect.

Jerry has been doing some interesting things at the end of Space. This night he treated us to some J.S. Bach -- a discordant but clearly recognizable Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring. Once again we're probably in the minority, but we think Corrina is a pretty cool song -- and the third night's version was no exception. Wharf Rat was, as usual, beautiful, and it slipped into a nice Throwin' Stones/Not Fade Away. The I Fought the Law encore was short, but probably the highlight of the evening. The whole band was bouncin' around having a great time.

The Cap Centre might not have the atmosphere we all like, but the shows tend to be consistently good. There were no long jams during the three-night run, but on the whole, the music was tight, and the guys looked great.

Chapel Hill Review

Our first and possibly last shows at the Dean E. Smith Center at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill ran the Grateful Dead gamut. The first night, March 24, was pretty mediocre, which is a tough statement to make about a show with a second set that began with Here Comes Sunshine, featured a rare Spanish Jam>Goin' Down the Road Feelin' Bad and had a Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds encore. The second night was a good solid show throughout, topped off by a strong Other One and a blistering Morning Dew - one of the best I've heard in more than two years. It certainly made up for the Dew played the first night at the Cap Centre, which was cut off by Sugar Magnolia.


First, let's talk about the venue. The Dean E. Smith Center is a shrine built to honor UNC's basketball coach, who is a living institution in North Carolina and a deity on campus. The Smith Center is a square-shaped basketball arena -- fine for round-ball but not so hot for concerts. At least one-third of the seats in the place had an obstructed view of the stage. Roughly two-thirds of the audience couldn't see the light show. Seats that would be wonderful in most other arenas had a lousy view of the band. You weren't even guaranteed to have a good seat in the 100 section because of the sharp angles and overhang of the upper deck.

Next, let's talk about the campus. It's just not set up to handle an influx of Deadheads. Apparently, most people simply walk to basketball games at the Dean Dome. Deadheads, on the other hand, were driving from far away. For whatever reason, the Powers That Be decided to keep most of the parking lots near the closed to Deadheads until 5 p.m. That created an awful mess in tiny downtown Chapel Hill, where traffic backed up most of the day and Deadheads overflowed onto Franklin Street. Traffic tie-ups on Interstate 40 meant that many fans driving from Raleigh missed some or all of the first night's first set. The traffic situation was only a little better the second night.

Now for the music. Definite highlight of the first night was the Spanish Jam>GDTRFB. Goin' Down the Road only got one airing in all of 1992 -- at the first Star Lake Amphitheater show outside Pittsburgh. It's a shame GDTRFB is fading away because it is such a foot-stomping crowd pleaser. The Here Comes Sunshine second set opener was the first on the East Coast, but I'm sorry -- the chorus sounded like a bunch of hoarse alley cats wailing into the night. There was no segue between Throwing Stones and Not Fade Away, a transition you'd think the boys would have down by now. But the Lucy in the Sky encore was sweet -- sweeter than the first version at the Cap Centre.

Night Number Two was a completely different story. Everything was smooth and sweet. Highlights of the first set included Minglewood, Friend of the Devil and Mexicali Blues. The timing was off in the chorus for I Know You Rider, but that was just a minor misstep, more than compensated for by the deliciously jazzy jam the followed Terrapin. You've already heard how great I thought the Other One and the Dew were. The only change that would have made Chapel Hill's second night even better would have been the I Fought the Law encore that the fans in Albany got the next show.



Nassau Review

"Coliseum Unearths Ancient Dinosaur." That sort of headline, taken in the context of a standard Grateful Dead concert review, might signal another disgruntled newspaper critic deriding the Dead as '60s relics. But fans who witnessed the band's April Fool's Day performance at Nassau Coliseum would understand the headline. That show, the best of the five-night series, featured a second set that began with Barney, the popular dinosaur cartoon character, on stage and playing bass guitar on *Iko Iko*. With at least six dinosaur cartoon series on TV, it was no wonder that one of Phil's sons was dancing ecstatically on the right side of the stage, picking up balloons tossed by Deadheads and throwing them at Daddy the Dinosaur.

Was it really Phil Lesh inside the six-foot purple costume? More than one Deadhead reported seeing Phil sitting behind the drumkit playing his bass. I was seated at the right of the stage and although I couldn't see Phil, I was wondering how he could so accurately pluck those bass lines wearing the costume's prehistoric mitts.

Warnings from the band, the Nassau County police department's recent record of multiple LSD busts at Dead concerts and the still nippy March weather limited the vending scene outside the Coliseum. In fact, the weather was bright and sunny on only one day, Monday, April 5, in time for the final show.

Thus, a fitting Cold Rain and Snow kicked off the first show of the run on Wednesday, March 31. The set remained true to old classics like Althea and Let it Grow as the group warmed to a New York audience eager to hear the Dead's half-dozen new additions to the live repertoire.

After a great start to set two with Cumberland Blues, the Dead jumped into Truckin', but Bobby forgot the beginning lyrics and picked up with the line, "Arrows of neon and flashing marquees out on Main Street..." But the connection had been made with the audience, which roared at Bobby's slip, and the band's timing was perfect to introduce Garcia-Hunter's Lazy River Road. The night was topped with an I Fought the Law encore. When the band came to the line about a "six-gun," Vince stood up and fired two imaginary shots at Garcia.

The Dead have a history of pranks on April Fool's Day, such as playing each others' instruments during a 1980 opening version of *Promised Land*, or Weir saying, "Thank you, good night," after a one-minute *Funiculi*, *Finicula* warmup at the 1988 gig.

A great first set showed off the band's state-of-the-art sound system (replacing onstage monitors with earphones) on Jack Straw, the brand-new Weir blues, Eternity and another Garcia-Hunter tune, Liberty -- a redressing of the title track to Robert Hunter's 1987 Liberty album. The song is the most upbeat of the new originals, offering these bright thoughts:

"If I was the sun, I'd look for shade,
If I was a bed, I would stay unmade;
If I was a river, I'd run uphill —
And if you call me, you know I will."

Barney the dinosaur made his appearance, and in keeping with the day's theme, the joke may have been on us. The group has been experimenting with bringing Welnick's Long Way to Go Home out of the space jam, and it worked well on April 1, leading into the new Garcia-Hunter Days Between, a song with a real edge to it. Another highlight of the five shows was the second night's encore: A tremendous, tight version — bountiful with vocals — of the song Ringo Starr said was his favorite Beatles recording, Rain, making its East Coast debut.

The next evening was highlighted by each set's opening runs: Help> Slipknot> Franklin's> Same Thing to begin set one, and a Scarlet> Fire> Women, replete with a magnanimous Terrapin to kick off the second set.

The stand's final two nights began Sunday, April 4, after a Saturday night off. The Sunday show began with Midnight Hour, making its return after a nine-month layoff since last summer's Buckeye show. Phil gave us a stirring second set version of Robbie Robertson's Broken Arrow.

The next night, we were finally greeted by warm weather and sunshine but **no** Here Comes Sunshine! Overcoming my distress at not hearing this nugget during the five shows series, I quickly began to enjoy the set, most notably the late first-set run of Black Throated> Tennessee Jed> Music Never Stopped and Deal. A '60s standard, Gloria, written by a teenage Van Morrison (then a member of the Irish band Them) closed the second set and brought the Nassau series and the tour to an appropriately romping conclusion. The U.S. Blues encore also brought the welcome relief of knowing that soon enough it would be "summer come, my oh my"...



Chicken in Cilantro Sauce

- 2 1-inch cubes ginger, coarsely chopped
- 1 cup water
- 6 TBSP vegetable oil
- 2-1/2 lbs. skinned chicken
- 5 cloves chopped garlic
- 3 cups cilantro
- 1 chopped green chili
- 1/2 tsp. cayenne
- 2 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 tsp. coriander seed ground
- 1/2 tsp. tumeric
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 TBSP lemon juice

Place ginger, 4 TBSP water in blender, blend til pasty. Heat oil in pot. Brown chicken on both sides, take out and put aside. Brown garlic in pot on medium heat, pour in past, stir and fry for one minute. Put in chicken and drippings. Add 2/3 cup water and lemon juice. Stir and bring to boil. Cover tightly. Heat low, cook 15 minutes, turn chicken over, cover, cook 15 more minutes.
